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Public Works Updates

Emily Street Reconstruction

Work is progressing on Emily Street. The contractor hopes to have all the underground works and roadbed completed by the end of this year. New watermain, sanitary, storm, curb and gutter and sidewalks are all part of the reconstruction. Traffic disruptions will continue into the late fall, and everyone's patience is greatly appreciated.

Public Washrooms

The new public washrooms are complete and open for business. They are bright and clean, accessible and safe for all to use. FAD Architects and Incon Construction were involved with the design and construction. And Operations staff completed the garden work.

Parry Sound Drive recreational trail

Operations staff worked through the summer months to complete the new trail connection between Parry Sound and McDougall, which runs along the side of Parry Sound Drive. The trail will be paved shortly, to be enjoyed for all non-motorized travel.

Bowes/Louisa Street retaining wall

The second part of the retaining wall replacement will start up in September. Weeks Construction was the low bid for this project, which will see the replacement of the crumbling retaining wall on the west side of Louisa Street. Traffic disruption will be kept at a minimum.

Waubeek Street Reconstruction

The Town received partial funding toward the total reconstruction of Waubeek Street, from the train bridge to Victoria Street. Also included in the overall project is Prospect Street and Melvin Avenue. The work will include a new sewage forcemain, watermain, sanitary sewer, storm sewer, curb and gutter, sidewalk and road surface. There is a lot of underground work to replace in this area, so there will be traffic disruptions. Work will commence in 2018.

Granite Harbour, Phase Three

The Salt Dock Road condominium is nearing completion of all three buildings.

Phase two is currently under construction with 32 units.

Phase three was recently approved by Council for 32 units as well. This third and final phase is expected to be completed some time in 2018.

Parry Sound Affordable Housing Corporation

The former William Beatty School renovation is largely complete.

Forty five residential units are within the former school as well as institutional uses.

The property is now also being developed with a 10 unit apartment/townhouse building as well.



Trestle Brewing Company Ltd. is a craft brewery in development that will be a premier destination in the heart of Parry Sound on the waterfront. The property is located at 9 Great North Road backing onto the Seguin River and has spectacular views looking towards Parry Sound's iconic CPR Trestle.

Long ago the property was occupied by one of the largest train stations in northern Ontario. Later, it was a fuel oil storage depot. The property had been vacant for almost 20 years and testing confirmed it was contaminated with hydrocarbons. After the purchase of the property by Trestle co-owners Dave Fusek and Chris Pettinger, they initiated a full site evaluation and cleanup. In December 2016, the contaminated soil was excavated and removed from the property and taken to a contaminated waste facility in Sudbury. Pettinger says "Dave and I determined early on that cleaning up the site was the right thing to do. It is an incredible location with a unique view and we feel fortunate to have this opportunity to build a project like this here." The Town of Parry Sound facilitated the clean-up of the contamination through the provincial REUSE program for Brownfield Remediation.

Construction of the new facility was set to begin at the end of March but ran into some significant setbacks. Construction is beginning with an anticipated finish sometime early in 2018.

"Our permit to manufacture beer was issued in mid-June on schedule so we had to adapt without our building being ready and have been brewing our beer under contract at breweries with excess capacity" says Fusek.

Trestle's brewmaster, Matt Lyons, has been brewing in Victoria, BC for 4 years and is a graduate of the Niagara College Teaching Brewery Program. He purchased a house and moved to town at the beginning of June with his wife and daughter. "Matt has been busy developing recipes and oversees production to meet industry quality assurance standards," says Pettinger.

"With the incredible outpouring of support we have had for the project, we say tongue in cheek that Matt is the most important guy to come to Parry Sound since J.R. Booth or William Beatty."

The company brews one beer currently - Trestle Golden Ale- which is slated for distribution in grocery stores across Ontario sometime the end of September or early October. "The artwork on the can label represents a view customers will see looking down the river from our patio towards the Town dock and the historic CPR Trestle" says Pettinger. "Our effort in developing our brand, the beer and our marketing and distribution plan are finally moving from concept to reality and it is humbling to see folks drinking and enjoying our beer at local restaurants and pubs." Once the 4000 sq. ft facility is open, there will be 4-6 regular craft beer offerings and other seasonal limited release beers throughout the year. The brewery will also feature food that pairs with the beers offered. "We won't be a full service restaurant, but it is important that we offer quality food choices that appeal to a wide audience," says Pettinger.

Trestle beer has been getting around Ontario this summer with the company attending some of the largest beer festivals including Session Muskoka, Kitchener-Waterloo Beer Festival and Head for the Hills Craft Beer Festival. "Attending these events is important for us as a networking opportunity with other breweries. We spread the word about our vision for our brewery and our products, and where we are and how to find us. The number one question we get is "Can I buy your beer at LCBO or Grocery?" Pettinger continued, "One of our goals is to have seasonal visitors enjoy the beer while they are in the Parry Sound area so that when they go home and they shop at their local LCBO or grocery store they recall that enjoyment they felt and purchase our products for enjoyment at home. Better yet, our area has so much to offer, we aim to get them to come back and visit again and again."

"This year we partnered with the MV Chippewa in offering craft beer sunset cruises and sold out repeatedly." "While the weather was fairly uncooperative, the cruises were enjoyed by all and we look forward to offering a full schedule of cruises next season" says Pettinger. One cruise was a fundraiser with Pedaling for Parkinson's and another raised funds for Hospice West Parry Sound.

Upon opening, Trestle anticipates employing 5 full time staff and by June the brewery will be home to as many as 8 full time and 10-12 seasonal employees.

Trestle beer is currently available only at finer establishments in the Parry Sound Area.

Municipal Election 2018

It seems like a long way off but it's closer than you think! As the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) did for the last election in 2014, eligible voters will have an opportunity to correct and update any of their voter information on-line before the municipal Clerks receive the voter's list (and a lot of paperwork has to be filled out). Have Your Say in Parry Sound Recreation Programming

To a lot of people, being on a sports team or having an afterschool activity is an essential part of their childhood. The benefits to participating in recreational activities go beyond physical and emotional. Getting out of the house, socializing with new friends, and being a part of something that is bigger than you is the greatest benefit of all. That sense of belonging is what makes us feel like we are important to and valued by others.

For many, the opportunities to take part in a recreational activity or sport are innumerable. That being said, it's important to note that a person with a disability typically does not have this same experience. While the aspiration to be on a team or participate in an activity is there, the opportunities to do so aren't always. Be it the lack of capacity of the recreation sector to deliver quality and preferable programming, the lack of specially trained personnel, or the lack of understanding of needs and abilities, there is a gap in the rate of participation between people with and without disabilities. Several community organizations such as the Town of Parry Sound, the YMCA, Community Living Parry Sound, and Parry Sound Bikes, are leading the initiative to address and close this gap.

The purpose of the partnership, aptly named Team All Abilities, is not to convene or create sports leagues and activities solely for the use of people with disabilities. The purpose is to make the sport and recreation sector and, ultimately, the community more inclusive to people of all abilities. Increasing participation in sport and recreation is seen as a shoo-in way for the lives of all people to drastically improve. Team All Abilities will optimize the knowledge and capacity of everyone involved in the sector so that leagues and activities are well equipped to offer programs to people of all skills and abilities.

Decades of facing barriers to participation in physical activity has created a population of people who no longer seek recreational community involvement. The lack of awareness of the barriers people face continues to stand in the way of full participation in sport and recreational activities. Team All Abilities will ensure that recreational activities are reshaped to fit the needs of all participants and through the establishment of a network of community connections, raise awareness.

The Town of Parry Sound's recreation department has collaborated with Team All Abilities by creating a survey that will establish the baseline data that both the town and the project need to accomplish their goals. The survey will allow its administrators to see what kind of activities people participate in, what they would be interested in participating in, where people find information about activities, and what sorts of barriers to participation they experience. The data pulled from this survey will help to inform the decisions and plans of action that the partners make from here on out. Team All Abilities is a collective initiative, and its success is contingent on understanding the needs of the community. With your help, we can build the capacity of the recreation sector to optimize inclusive opportunities for people of all abilities. With your help, we can ensure that every person in Parry Sound lives a wholesome life and feels as though they belong.
